MOTIONS FROM THE ADJUDICATION COMMITTEE

Motion 1:

New adjudicators must be certified in Solo & Ensemble for one year before consideration is given to adding marching, concert and jazz categories. New adjudicators may petition the Adjudication Committee to waive this rule.

Rationale: Judging Concert, Marching and Jazz MPA are very difficult and directors should gain experience with S&E first. This gives district chairman and the adjudication committee the opportunity to observe the adjudicator before starting the internship process in these areas. If motion 2 passes and the potential adjudicator finishes in time, they could judge in their 8^{th} and 9^{th} year of teaching and then be considered for additional categories and internships. The average amount of teaching years before judging in these areas from many of our certified judges is 10 years. With directors taking more time before they are certified in these areas, more rating data is compiled on the potential adjudicator.

Current Projects:

- 1. Paul Baker, Bakers Jazz and More Publishing, has agreed to write a piece for the Glades MS Jazz Band Performance at the 2015 Midwest Clinic. The piece should be ready for the performance, including publishing. In addition, Erich Rivero will program the same piece with the 2017 All-State Middle School Jazz Band. The title and style has been released yet. The price paid for this commission was \$1,000.
- 2. Michael Markowski has agreed to write a piece for the 2017 All-State Symphonic (11-12) Band under the direction of Bill Wakefield. The committee is still is negotiation with Michael regarding the style and length; we hope to have that finalized at our committee meeting during the summer convention. Michael has agreed to be in attendance during the 2017 FMEA clinic and for the premiere. We have not finalized a price for this large work yet, but it will be around \$5,000 \$10,000. - 3. Larry Clark has agreed to compose a grade 4 march in honor of John DeYoung. The march will be titled *Mr*. *Bartow* and will be premiered by the 9-10 All-State Concert Band in January 2016, conducted by Dr. Ken

Ozzello from the University of Alabama. This piece is a co-commission with the Bartow Concert Band, each paying \$2,000.

4. William Brusick has agreed to compose a grade 2-3 piece in honor of Duane Hendon. The piece will be premiered by the All-State MS Honor Band in January 2016, conducted by Dayna Cole. The title has not been released yet. The price paid for this commission was \$2,500.

Past Projects:

- 1. David Maslanka Consortium Commission fro Gary Green's retirement from the University of Miami. FBA will be listed on the score along with the others from the consortium when it is published. The price paid for this commission was \$500.
- 2. Paul Basler, from UF, completed grade 3 piece for the 2015 Nine Star Honor Band premiered at the summer convention by Ted Shistle. The price paid for this commission was \$2,500.
- 3. Robert Sheldon has completed his grade 3.5 piece in honor of Jack Crew. The title is *Die Lehrmeister*, which translates to "The Master Teacher". The All-State HS Honor Band will premiere this in January 2016, conducted by Neil Jenkins. The price paid for this commission was \$2,500.
- 4. FBA did a co-commission with FVA for a work for Men's Chorus and Concert Band that was premiered at the 2015 All-State Concert. Julian Bryson, a Doctoral Student at the University of Kentucky, was the composer. The piece was dedicated to the 2015 All-State Groups and will be published by Hinshaw Publications in a TB with piano version as well as the TB with full concert band accompaniment. FVA and FBA both paid \$500 for the commission.

Future Projects:

- 1. Working on suggestions for the 2016 and 2017 Nine Star Honor Band. The committee is currently in discussion for a composer to fit this requirement. Hope to have something in place later this fall.
- 2. Initial discussion has started to commission a piece to honor Dr. Bobby Adams. An update will be given at the December board meeting.

Inclusion in District Meetings: The Mentoring Committee is suggesting that the caption "Mentoring Liaison's Report" be added to the official FBA District Meeting Agenda. This will encourage liaisons to be active in their district and to remind the membership that all directors have a shared responsibility in encouraging professional development among its young directors.

<u>Mentoring Guidelines</u>: To better facilitate the building of successful mentor/protégé pairings, a set of guidelines has been developed for district liaison, mentors, and protégés. The guidelines are fluid and should be augmented as needed to meet the needs of each district. *See Attached*

Recommendation for future discussion:

The Mentoring Committee strongly encourages the leadership of the FBA and its membership to explore and discuss the organization's role in the development of instrumental music educators in the state of Florida. Mentoring can be one component of the association's commitment to growing the finest band directors, and ultimately the finest bands in the country, but it can certainly not be the only element of a program committed to professional development among band directors. The FBA has demonstrated its commitment to and focus on assessment. The committee recommends pursuing the next logical step, an equal commitment to improving what is demonstrated through music performance assessment by focusing on the professional development of band directors. A commitment to professional development, however, will not come without dedicated attention and resources. The matter of professional development, therefore, will have far reaching implications for the association, but also the potential for widespread benefits for its members. The sweeping questions lying before the FBA leadership and its membership with regard to professional development are: Does the FBA perceive itself as a regulatory agency, collecting fees and penalties and assessing performances, or does the FBA distinguish itself as a professional association focused on the development of its membership? And, How does the perception of the FBA's leaders and membership influence the growth of the organization?

District Mentoring Guidelines 2015

Communication and Connection are key to successful mentoring relationships. Even though mentors and protégés are peers, mentors are considered the educational leaders in the mentor-protégé pair. The relationship is mutual, but the mentors should assume responsibility for engaging novice directors. Mentors must be engaged with their protégés to a degree that would offer them enough information to assess their abilities and skills in the classroom. Mentors must also have the skills and desire to guide their protégés through their gaps in knowledge and other challenges of being a secondary band director. Should mentors feel they are not succeeding with their protégé they should turn to the district liaison for coaching or possibly reassigning the protégé. Should novice directors feel they are not receiving the attention or help they need, they should also approach the district liaison for alternatives. The connection between mentors and protégés is

strongly related to their concept of mentoring as a mutual activity between two peers or a hierarchical activity between a junior - senior or employee - boss. It is important that protégés understand that their mentors have no authority over them, nor in most cases do they want it. Mentors are guides and resources.

The activities and timelines outlined in this document are presented as references and resources. They are provided as support materials so both members of a mentoring pair understand the expectations and the roles of mentors and protégés.

The following is presented as a suggestion for interaction and topics of discussion and monitoring between mentors and protégés. These suggestions would include at a minimum:

- Regular check-ins: bi-weekly at a minimum
 - Check-ins can be electronic (email, phone, or text)
 - Face-to-face check-ins should happen at least quarterly
 - o Check-ins can be group activities and do not necessarily have to be one on one meetings
- Curriculum Support / Classroom Management
 - o Sharing ideas and concerns on instructional materials, literature, and student assessment
 - Sharing techniques and concerns regarding teacher assessments
 - Methods of engagement and management
 - Pedagogy
 - Instrument Specific
 - Small and Large Ensemble
 - Marching Band
 - Instrument Fittings for Beginners
 - Philosophy of Music Education and Music Teaching
 - What do you want your program to look like and why
 - Are you student focused and music focused
 - What place does music education have in your students' complete education
- Program Support
 - o Methods on inventory management, library resources, county documentation of all varieties
 - FBA Documentation and Calendars
 - Deadlines
 - MPA Online
 - FBA Handbook
 - o Extra-Curricular Activities
 - Positives and Pitfalls
 - Required Documentation
 - Finance Management and Documentation
 - County Policies/Procedures
 - FBA Procedures
- Psychosocial Support
 - Is this a good pairing?
 - Check comfort level with each other
 - Work-life balance
 - Integrating into school community
 - Communication with administration
 - Communication with other teachers
 - Finding meaning and reward in work

Pairing mentoring and protégés is paramount to successful mentoring relationships. Career band directors volunteering to mentor should be committed, interested, and articulate professionals. When pairing career and novice band directors, it is important that careful attention is given to the individuals and their personalities. Geography is certainly a factor that must be considered, but personalities and the needs of each participant must be the primary consideration. After a pairing has been made, if it is learned that personalities were not a good compliment, suggest an alternate pairing. These things happen. It is not a negative reflection on either participant. District liaisons should also consider that perhaps one-on-one mentoring might not be the best approach within districts that span large areas and are comprised of dozens of directors from a variety of backgrounds.

It is important the district mentoring liaison monitor the success of pairing. Pairing is a very hap hazardous process in most districts, and the odds are that not every pairing will be successful. Liaisons should check in a regular basis with BOTH members of a mentoring pair to check that:

- Mentor and protégé are checking in a regular basis
- Personalities work at least at a professional level
- Does the novice director find any benefit from his/her mentor?
- Does the mentor believe he/she is being received well by his/her protégé?
- Are there any resources available that would help with mentor and protégé to be more successful in the relationship or as a director?

Pairing cannot be discussed without stating that mentoring is not for everyone. Even though effective mentoring can be a positive source for the professional development for mentors and protégés, one must have the right personality and be open to the relationship for it to be successful. Mentors should be asked to reflect on their personalities before offering to mentor a novice director. They should ask themselves:

- Do I enjoy spending time with young educators?
- Am I interested in helping a novice director?
- Do I have / am I willing to make the time to work with a novice director?
- Am I willing to share my techniques and secrets?
- What will I get out of being a mentor?

Should an experienced director choose to be formally paired with a novice director or just want to help a younger director, here are a few things to keep in mind:

- Not all young directors will ask for help they might not realize they need it.
- Offering help is not an invasion if it is done in the right way
 - Treat a young director professionally, but using a teacher's lens
 - Do not be afraid of being viewed as arrogant if you're doing some good things in rehearsals or think your concert is going to be worth hearing – invite other directors. (You can always tell someone you want "their ears.")

Because of their lack of awareness and experience, most young directors should be encouraged to have a mentor, even if they are not interested in being social or do not think they have much to learn from another band director. Novice directors who do not want a mentor probably do not understand how much they need one or how helpful a mentor can be. Novice directors should be encouraged to find a mentor in a way that best suits them. Should they not be interested in an FBA pairing, offer the following:

- Seek out prior college instructors/cooperating teachers.
- Listen to Bands
 - By watching and listening to other bands, you will learn who is successful. The FBA web-page is also a good place to check for ratings. (Remember, though, ratings are not the ONLY indicator of a successful band program.)
- Turn to SUCCESSFUL band directors for Pedagogy/ Classroom Management Techniques/Rehearsal Advice
 - Don't be afraid of rejection from other directors most often, it's not you
 - Ask to observe rehearsals / attend concerts.
 - Invite people over
 - A clinician is not always a mentor, but you will certainly learn something. A clinician, however, could also turn into a mentor.
- Attend FBA functions and meetings
 - Your mentor should be someone with whom you enjoy spending time and share mutual interests or find interesting outside of the band world.
 - Look for mentors who are not threatened by your or others' success.
 - Look for mentors who place the same value on musicianship, citizenship, competition, and assessment as you.

Liaisons are FBA members appointed by the district chairman to serve mentor and novice directors. The role and expectations of the district mentoring liaisons are:

- Pairing experienced band directors (mentors) with novice directors, directors with fewer than 3 years of teaching experience or new to the state (protégés)
- Contacting Mentoring Committee to help find resources for mentors as needed
- Making mentor recommendations to any director as needed
- Periodically check-in with mentors and protégés to assess needs, offer assistance, and re-direct as needed
- Organizing district events for novice directors to enhance professional development and camaraderie
- Communicating progress, ideas, and concerns to the Mentoring Committee

JULY 2015 REPORT

Below is a summary of the information gathered to this point concerning the Classification Pilot in District 9. Given the extreme diversity of our great State, it is the recommendation of the committee that we extend this study to include a cross section of both rural and urban communities. A huge thank you goes out to Robin Benoit and District 9 for their hard work in establishing the guidelines for this project.

CLASSIFICATION PROJECT - DISTRICT 9

During the 2014/2015 school year, FBA District 9 participated in the first year of a two-year classification project to study the effect of allowing directors to choose their classifications based on the level of music they perform at Music Performance Assessment, instead of basing their classification on school size. As background information, District 9 volunteered for this study due to the fact that participation in MPA's is subsidized by the county (assessment fees and transportation are paid for), and an expectation in Pinellas County Schools that schools participate in the FSMA sanctioned assessment.

For some background information - below is listed the reclassification information for the previous three years:

2011/2012: 10 - High School reclassifications, 1- middle school reclassification

2012-2013: 10 - High School reclassifications, 0 - middle school reclassifications

2013-2014: 9 - High School reclassifications, 0 - middle school reclassifications

For the 2014/2015 school year, our schools filled out their regular classification forms in October. This was done to determine what their classification would be under the current classification system. Then, in January – directors filled out a supplemental form that stated their classification based on their choice of literature (this form was signed by both the director and principal). Once they declared their classification, their literature choices needed to fall under their declared classification. Once they declared their classification, they needed to stay within those grade levels (they were able to change literature within their grade level - up until 10 days before the event). As a result, fewer directors turned in TBA titles.

We provided the directors with the classification charts found below. We decided to produce two charts.

We chose to use the following levels for High School classification (* levels are for 2nd and 3rd bands only):

The following chart lists the classifications for high schools (the * level is for 2nd or 3rd bands only):

Data below shows the choices that our directors made:

HIGH SCHOOL

- 12 Bands that chose classification above their enrollment based classification (Note: 6 of these bands received a superior rating)
- 6 Bands that chose classification below their enrollment based classification (Note: none of these bands received a superior rating)
- 9 Bands that kept their classification as their enrollment based classification (Note: 4 bands received a superior)

MIDDLE SCHOOL

- 4 Bands that chose classification above their enrollment based classification (Note: 3 bands received a superior)
- 3 Bands that chose classification below their enrollment-based classification (Note: 0 bands received a superior)
- 20 Bands that kept their classification as their enrollment based classification (Note: 8 bands received a superior)

Some feedback that directors gave to the district: PROS:

1) This new system required directors to focus equally on all the aspects of MPA (both concert and sight-reading).

2) Directors felt empowered when programming and helped directors focus on their bands strengths and weaknesses when they were choosing their literature.

3) Directors liked being able to make choices in January, especially in schools with high mobility or higher levels of remediation (due to changes at semester with personnel).

4) Directors felt that the level of music performed on stage and what was sight-read was closer in alignment (bands did not prepare higher levels of music for the stage, yet read a significantly lower level in sight-reading).

5) The J/S bands in our district did not see any kind of impact due to the lack of any J/S classification – they chose their classification based off the level of music they programmed.

CONS:

1) When attempting a higher level of music on the stage, especially in 2^{nd} bands, the higher level of sight-reading proved to be daunting. We had one band in particular that experienced this; however, even though they chose to stretch their group – they did receive an overall superior in their performance.

2) For directors to choose a classification - there would need to be more explanation or a rubric to help guide directors between the different sight-reading levels. Most questions to the district chair revolved around what musical concepts would be included in the different sight-reading levels.

We also asked the adjudicators at our MPA's to give some feedback as to whether the bands chose the appropriate level of literature for their band. We had several bands that the adjudicators felt the director chose literature that was too easy; however, none of those bands received superior ratings. We did have a couple of bands the adjudicators felt the level chosen was too difficult for the band. But for the grand majority – the adjudicators felt the levels chosen were on point for the groups.

G. LEGACY COMMITTEE (Tina Laferriere):

Legacy Project Report, July 2015

There are now 50 Legacy interviews posted on the FBA website. We are quite pleased with the quality, variety and substance of these.

Although 3 more have already agreed to be interviewed at this summer's convention, we have experienced difficulty getting the remaining 10 to respond to repeated requests to schedule their interviews. Some are reticent to be designated a Legacy, some live out of state, others no longer travel to FBA events. Email, text and phone contacts have not brought results, so all will now receive handwritten invitations to be interviewed. These invitations will be available with the convention badges at the registration table. Any invitations not picked up, will be snail-mailed to the Legacy designees. Suggestions on how to proceed if this does not generate a response are welcome.

By, or before, the January Board Meeting, the Project should be ready to compile a new list of additional Legacy Members with the help of the Executive Board.

MOTIONS FROM THE ADJUDICATION COMMITTEE

Motion 1: All college/university directors who taught secondary school in the state of Florida must meet the requirements stated in the FBA Handbook/Adjudicator Manual to become a certified adjudicator for FBA.

Rationale: Any director at a college and/or university currently in Florida who taught middle or high school band in Florida should be held to the same standards as current public school directors. The college/university director must meet the 3 out of 5 year requirement to be a concert/Sight-reading adjudicator, and an excellent average over 5 years to be a solo and ensemble adjudicator. The committee will look at the last 5 years the college/university director taught public school in Florida to determine eligibility. Just teaching at a college/university will not trump the standards set by the FBA.

PASSED BY THE BOARD - MAY 2015

Motion 2: To change the number of teaching years from 7 to 6 in order to be eligible for consideration to the adjudicators list.

Rationale: The process to become an official FBA adjudicator takes at least a year, if not more. If a director is nominated after 6 years of experience, the director will then take a year to complete the paperwork and intern. By the end of their 7th year, all paperwork and internships should be completed and final approval would be given at the May board. Therefore, directors are still completing their 7 years before they are added to the list. With the current requirement, directors are not completed with their process until after their 8th year of teaching. With the shortage of S&E adjudicators across the state, this

should help with the availability of certified adjudicators

A. Performance Assessments. All wind instrument solos must be submitted with a piano accompaniment as part of the application process and recorded entry.

Rationale from the Committee:

This past year two string ensembles were submitted and are not adjudicated in the FBA MPA events. Only wind instrument solos and ensembles, percussion solos and ensembles and piano solos and duets may be submitted to the committee. The committee strongly recommends that all wind solos MUST have piano accompaniment written and included on the recording that is submitted for consideration. This past year two wind solos were submitted without accompaniment and

these would have been stronger entries had an accompaniment part been included. The request to <u>underline and bold print</u> <u>the words "used in FBA Music Performance Assessments</u> was to call attention to this important aspect of the application process and to eliminate any further misunderstanding.

In addition, the student must be a regular participating member of an ensemble equivalent to the above in the music cooperative. Home education students, must be sponsored by their Active FMEA/Component member teacher from that home education music cooperative.
